Saint THEODOSIUS, Abbot

Optional memorial

Saint Theodosius (423-529), a native of Cappadocia, came to the Holy Land and lived for some time in a monastery located between Jerusalem and Bethlehem. He then retired to the desert of Judea and lived as a hermit for forty years. His reputation for holiness attracted many disciples to him. He founded a large monastery that bears his name (Deir Dosi, 7 km south of Bethlehem), where all visitors were welcomed with love. He suffered much for his loyalty to the Council of Chalcedon, but neither the threats of the Emperor Anastasius nor even exile shook his faith. He died in 529, at the age of 105, and was buried in his monastery.

Saint Theodosius had a sense of the unity of the Church, a unity that respects diversity. His monastery being opened to all, he wanted the praise of God to be sung in different languages, everyone expressing his own heart.

Today's liturgy evokes the unity of the living body of the Church.
